

# Critical Thinking Evaluation Rubric

## 1. Clarity of Purpose & Understanding of the Task

### Exemplary:

The student demonstrates a precise, complete understanding of the task or problem. The purpose is articulated clearly, with no ambiguity, and all key elements of the prompt are fully addressed.

## 2. Depth of Analysis

### Exemplary:

The student provides a deeply reasoned, insightful analysis that goes beyond surface-level explanation. Identifies patterns, relationships, and underlying principles with sophistication.

## 3. Use of Evidence

### Exemplary:

Evidence is highly relevant, accurate, specific, and well-integrated. The student selects the strongest possible evidence and explains clearly how each piece supports their reasoning.

## 4. Evaluation of Alternatives & Counterarguments

### Exemplary:

The student anticipates, evaluates, and responds to multiple perspectives or counterarguments with nuance and fairness. Demonstrates strong ability to weigh alternatives and justify choices.

## 5. Reasoning & Logical Coherence

### Exemplary:

Arguments are logically structured, with each claim backed by strong reasoning. There are no gaps or inconsistencies; the thinking is cohesive, rigorous, and compelling.

## 6. Decision-Making Under Constraints

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**Exemplary:**

The student shows excellent judgment when navigating constraints (time, resources, tradeoffs). Provides a well-justified conclusion that reflects balanced, evidence-based evaluation.

## 7. Creativity & Original Insight

**Exemplary:**

The student presents original ideas, innovative solutions, or novel connections that elevate the work. Shows intellectual curiosity and unique thinking that goes beyond expected responses.

## 8. Reflection on Process

**Exemplary:**

The student thoughtfully explains their reasoning process, choices, and revisions. Demonstrates metacognitive awareness and meaningful learning from the task.

## 9. Contextual Integration (Local, Personal, or Situational)

**Exemplary:**

The student seamlessly incorporates contextual or personal elements (class events, local issues, lived experience) that enrich the argument and demonstrate authentic, grounded thinking.

## 10. Communication & Presentation of Ideas

**Exemplary:**

Ideas are presented with clarity, precision, and purpose. Writing (or speaking) is engaging, well-organized, free of errors, and enhances the strength of the reasoning.
